


If the answer is yes, why not join the Scott Bader ROOKIE Club and work through the RLSS Rookie programme.



The Scott Bader ROOKIE Club is run for competent swimmers on a Wednesday evening between 7 – 8.00 pm in the Company Swimming pool.

It is a structured programme set out by the Royal Life Saving Society with achievement awards promoting lifesaving, water safety, personal survival and first aid skills through fun learning. Receive badges and certificates for your achievements. We run 2 groups, bronze and Silver & Gold.

The Monthly fee is £15.00 per child, which is used to buy equipment and sponsor additional activities such as open water activities – Wind surfing, Kayaking, sailing, and raft races. We also have other activities

throughout the year, scuba diving, bowling and visiting the local Christmas Panto.

# **2nd Wollaston Scouts Group**

Within each age range within Scouts, our young people work towards a major award. In

the Scout section, age 10½ -14, they are aiming to attain the Chief Scout's Gold Award.

As you might expect, this is not an easy task. It involves the completion of nine separate Challenge awards,



each of which is not simple to earn. These are:

The Adventure Challenge – this involves taking part in at least four adventurous activities. We provide lots of opportunities for this at our annual camp.

The Creative Challenge – this requires the Scout to take part in at least four creative activities

The Expedition Challenge – this necessitates taking part in a two-day expedition

The Outdoors Challenge – Scouts must take an active part in at least eight nights away, completing many tasks and understanding how to organise a camp. Most of our Scouts have completed many more nights away than this,

The Personal Challenge – Scouts must complete two challenges, one set by the Scout Leaders, the other one set at home.

The Skills Challenge – this involves taking a regular part in physical activities and demonstrating some essential life skills (from a list including cooking a meal, fixing a puncture and cleaning a loo!)

The Team Leader Challenge – as an older and more experienced member of the Troop, will lead a team at camp, help a new Scout and represent the other Scouts at a meeting.

The Teamwork Challenge – this is all about



being part of a team and learning how to work with others.

The World Challenge – amongst other things, this involves learning about your local community, exploring your beliefs, taking part in an environmental project, learning about an international issue and making contact with Scouts in another country.

I am pleased to say that, of the four young people about to move up to Explorers, two have completed their Gold Award and a third will have the opportunity to do so over the next few months. Well done to them.

On another subject, I would like to thank everyone who supported our burger stall at the Wollaston Festival. It was a good fundraiser for the Group but, more than that, it was great to say hello to so many people from the village.



Sundays were always special. As children we had to wear our Sunday best clothes and playing activities were strictly limited. We were sent to Sunday school in the morning and afternoon. Prizes were given for good attendance at prize giving once a year. We always had relations for tea on Feast Sunday. The best tea service would come out, and tea would consist of sandwiches followed by tinned fruit, with which you had to eat bread and butter. After tea, if the weather was reasonable, and it always was, everybody went for a walk.

At its peak Wollaston Feast must have been as large as any in the district. For many years as you entered the field you would find two sweet stalls on the right. One was owned by a wartime pal of my Father's. He always bought something and had a chat with his old friend. The most notable thing they sold was spit rock, made on site. We used to watch it being made by being stretched on a hook fixed to the side of the stall. I think all the sweets were hand made and included brandy snap, coconut ice and toffee apples. Dart stalls were on the left as you went in with a later addition of tin cans to be knocked over using dusters. Then came the air guns, shooting at targets with metal darts. Other stalls included a rifle range; shooting at clay pipes or small balls suspended on jets of water. The coconut shy; throwing wooden balls at real coconuts sitting on beds of sawdust which I suspect used to make them difficult to knock off. Roll a penny at which you very rarely won. In addition to these stalls were the row of skittles tables of a type only seen in Northamptonshire. These were lit with paraffin flares similar to those used to illuminate the runways during WW2. The top prize was a tuppeny packet of

five Wills Woodbine cigarettes for a stackup or a cupful of nuts as a consolation prize. The participant would hold open his coat pocket to receive them. Apart from the Flying Horses or Gallopers as they are sometimes called, we also had the Chairplane and on one occasion The Cakewalk. Then along came the dodgems and I think it was called The Waltzer. I nearly forgot the swingboats; they would hold about four people. After being push-started by the proprietor they were propelled by the occupants pulling on ropes (like those used in Church for ringing the bells). If they got too high the proprietor would lift up a plank that rubbed on the bottom of the boat and acted as a brake. We as kids at feast time would have our own stalls. To have one you needed an old dart that had been discarded and a board on which you nailed a few cigarette cards. To win a card you had three goes per card thrown from the edge of the pavement. The cards got a bit dogeared towards the end of the week.

About a third of the food produced around the world goes to waste, and much of it ends up in landfills—where it becomes a source of methane, a greenhouse gas 25 times more potent than carbon dioxide. Eliminating waste is the ultimate solution, but some will always remain. For that there is a solution that nearly anyone can do: composting. There are many great reasons to try composting rather than putting compostable materials into landfill:

- 1. Composting reduces waste, makes us less dependent on landfills, and decreases greenhouse gas emissions. With all the hoo -ha recently about a possible cost coming in to remove our brown bins/garden waste, reducing the amount of stuff we put in them is surely a good idea. You'd be surprised at the amount of garden waste that is excellent on a compost heap!
- **2. Compost strengthens soil and promotes healthy plant growth** Your plants, flowers and veggies will love you for it!
- **3. Composting reduces the need for pesticides and synthetic fertilizers.** The birds, bugs and the bees will love you for it!
- **4. Composting recycles essential nutrients** back into the soil. If you grow veggies all these nutrients will come back to you when you eat them. Your body will love you for it!
- **5.** Compost promotes a prolific soil ecosystem. Biodiversity. Your planet will love you for it!





Composting is not as difficult as you might think. You can source affordable compost bins from most garden centres and DIY stores but you can also just earmark a corner of your garden and make a 'heap'! If you compost correctly your heap shouldn't be smelly and in time you will have some lovely, organic, nutrient rich compost to spread around the rest of your garden.



Compostable stuff includes: fruit and veg peel and waste, egg shells, tea bags, coffee grinds, grass cuttings, leaves, paper towels and cardboard. Just remember to never put meat/fish scraps, cheese, dairy or fats in your compost.



# Step 1 - Password security

- Strong memorable passwords can easily be created by combining three random words. (eg. Trampoline%Sleepy%Dishwasher)
- Create new passwords for any toys, games, smart devices, etc. connected to the Internet.
- ▶ Never share passwords or on-screen codes with anyone no matter who they claim to be.
- ▶ Consider using a trusted Password Manager if you access multiple website accounts.
- ▶ Always make sure you use a different password for each account or site.

# Step 2 - Extra account protection

- ▶ Two-factor authentication (2FA) adds an extra layer of security to your online account.
- Enable 2FA (via account settings) on each of your important accounts such as email, photo, shopping and social media sites.

### Step 5 - Avoid online scams

- ▶ Do not click on links in any unverified emails, texts or other messages (eg. WhatsApp).
- Verify using a trusted phone number or contact or check via their official website or app.
- Never be rushed into clicking a link that requests you reset your password, secure your account or requires your personal or banking details.
- No genuine organisation will phone or message you unexpectedly and ask you to make changes to your device or give them remote access.

# Step 3 - Software updates

- Always keep your device software, apps and other programs up-to-date to fix newly identified security bugs and vulnerabilities.
- ▶ Also enable Automatic Updates on your computer, phone and tablet where available.
- ▶ Do not use devices that cannot be fully updated as this may put your personal data at risk.

# Step 4 - Backup important data

- Make regular copies of all your important documents, messages, contacts, photos and videos on a separate device or system.
- ▶ Ideally use at least one local backup (eg. flash drive, separate hard drive) and a cloud based backup (eg. iCloud, OneDrive, Google Drive).
- Ensure all of your important documents are included, and that you also disconnect local backup drives to minimise the affect of malware.




# Secure Logon Required

# How does Two Factor Authentication work?

In addition to a strong long password, accounts secured with two factor authentication use a second factor to verify the user when logging on. This is something that only you have or have trusted access to, such as an app

on a personal device or a phone number which can be used to receive logon text messages or calls.



#### How do I use Two Factor Authentication?

To switch on two factor authentication on each of your accounts you will need to access them using a web

browser or dedicated app. This feature may also be called two-step verification (2SV) on some apps/accounts, but essentially works the same. Instructions on enabling two factor authentication (2FA or 2SV) for most popular email, commerce and social media websites can be found on the reverse of this flyer.

### What if my online account doesn't support Two Factor Authentication?

We would ideally like to see two factor authentication offered on all online accounts and services which might hold your personal data, have access to your money, or play an important role in your life. Although most do offer it, some large providers like BT, Virgin Media and TalkTalk still don't. If it is not available on an important account like email, you should ensure it is secured with a long strong and separate password.
