### A night for a fright! A story from Margret Summers

During the war a dance was held each Saturday evening in the Parochial Hall. Edie Bayes and myself always attended as our husbands were away in the army, fighting in the war. One evening whilst dancing away quite happily, the sirens began groaning, as usually happened. We all had to go home.

One the way home sirens seemed to be getting nearer so we sheltered in a door way. Whilst standing there a drunken man swayed up to us saying "Are you taking shelter?" Believe me, we were much more afraid of him than we were the bombs being dropped on Green Lane.

We left the shelter and ran home as fast as we could forgetting that bombs were being dropped less than half a mile away. We have had many laughs over the years about this incident. After a long silence, it is great to once again have a publication which provides news and information, to the people of Wollaston, on a regular basis.

Welcome to Wollaston Together, a magazine which will bring the Community of Wollaston together, and tell you about the different activities going on in the village, and the local business services available.

The last few years have been very difficult for us all. The past two years learning to live with the Covid virus brought fears and uncertainty to the Community. Those dark days were enlightened by the odd moment of coming together, as evidenced by the unveiling of the monument to the seven airmen killed on Shepherds Hill on the 22<sup>nd</sup> of June 1941. It was truly amazing to see the generosity of the Community to recognize these unsung heroes, and the number of Wollastonians who came to show their respect, showed great respect to these brave airmen.

Due to the pandemic, the usual Council term was extended by a further two years. It was during this extension that Angela Young, after many years of service, decided to step down from the position of Clerk to the Parish Council. Councillors would like to extend our thanks to Angela for her many years of service to the Parish of Wollaston, and wish her well in the future.

Following the recruitment process Ms Debra Styles, was asked to take over the role of Clerk and Chief Financial Officer to the Parish Council. Debra has brought a fresh perspective to the role of Clerk, and taken a proactive approach to Social Media communications. Debra has also completed full Clerk training, and gained a Certificate in Local Council Administration, which means that she will be able to provide knowledgeable guidance and support to the Chair and Councillors, which will ensure that the Parish Council has the information it needs, to gain the best results for Wollaston.

The last two years, have brought about a lot of change to Wollaston. We now have a new Unitary Authority to serve our needs and the Parish Council election in May 2021, saw the stepping down of a number experienced Councillors, and the election of five new Councillors They have spent the last twelve months finding their feet, and understanding the role of the Parish Council and their role as Councillors within it.

On behalf of the Parish of Wollaston, we should thank and recognize the service given over many years from Sue Fowler, Pamela Bailey, Allan Bailey, Jim McKenzie and Geoff Simmons, and welcome Paul Jones, Alan Threadgold, Greg Carter, Richard

Talbutt and Callum Boddington. The Parish Council welcomes these new Councillors and looks forward to the insight that they will bring to our Community.

The impact of Covid and the local political changes at County / Unitary level have resulted in a failure to get together at Parish Council meetings and with Planning and Highways Officers who have provided a lot of support to the Parish in the past. Thankfully, with the increase in vaccinations, those days are slowly retreating, and we look forward to returning to original working relationships with these Unitary colleagues going forward.

Even during the pandemic, there have been a number of improvements made to the village, and I call out the resurfacing of Back Way, made possible by a mix of public and council finance, the upgrade of children's play equipment, the removal of dangerous trees along Hinwick Road, the cleaning up of Wollaston Brook amongst others. We also have a more attentive Police presence, looking at inappropriate road behaviors, parking and anti-social behavior. This increased presence is there to protect the Community; so if you see or hear something that should be brought to their attention then please call 101 or if it is an emergency the 999 number is still the one to use.

It is also great that the Library in Wollaston is still open and serving the Community. We should thank the volunteers and the benefactors, who have come together, to ensure that this facility continues to be available to the people of Wollaston.

Finally, we are all slowly coming out of a period of deep depression and waking up to a new dawn. The coming together of a group of residents under the banner Wollaston Events Committee are putting a fresh energy into bringing the village back to life. The relaunch of a village magazine is just one part of the future activities planned with a Party in the Park to celebrate the Platinum Anniversary of her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth, and a number of other events leading up to Christmas. Great to see social activity picking up in the village and also to add the various events planned at The Hill, the Works and the Wollaston Inn. Finally, please visit our Museum and Beacon Hill, located off the High Street. There you will find many fascinating stories about the village, and many members of this community, brought together and managed for you, by a group of dedicated volunteers.

Last but not least, our thanks must go out to the merchants who kept their shops open so that we could still buy our groceries locally and of course the hot food and takeaways who brightened up a generally gloomy time.

It has been a difficult period but we are now starting to move on with our lives and I take this opportunity to wish you all well and keep safe.

It has been an exciting few months at the Primary School with lots of positive changes being implemented and lots more on the horizon. Although our school no longer uses the word community in its title we still believe the community is an essential part of us being able to raise standards so we have been busy organising lots of community projects to help our school improve. The biggest one currently is our Early Years renovation project which has been backed by WABIK and is aiming to transform this space so our reception children get access to the absolute best. We have already had so many offers of help from a range of people across the village and the team and I are so grateful for this and we look forward to sharing the final outcomes with everyone once it is complete. ## **HOOKHAMS PATH DEVELOPMENT**

By the time this editorial is read the Parish Council hopes the S106 legal document will have finally been agreed and signed and full planning permission reference **WP/20/00314/FUL** is granted to Bloor Homes to commence the development.

The development of 98 dwellings, a community woodland, SuDS attenuation, open space including children's play area, access arrangements off Hookhams Path, and associated landscaping, infrastructure and ancillary development to the east of Hookhams Path is part of a target of 160 new homes set for Wollaston in 2012 by the North Northamptonshire Joint Core Strategy (2011 - 2031). The land owner is The Duchy of Lancaster and the Developer will be Bloor Homes, a combination that is expected to deliver a high standard of housing.



Α planning application was presented by Bloor Homes to the former Borough Council of Wellingborough who resolved on 4 November 2019 to grant planning permission in principle subject to a S106 legal agreement being agreed and signed by all parties. The subsequent legal process has taken the solicitors of The Bloor Duchv. Homes North and Northants Council 30 months to complete. The final 106 agreement is now expected to be signed by the end of March and a copy of the final version along with the planning permission will be posted on the North Northants Planning website under reference WP/20/00314/FUL and also on the Parish Council website.

Some statutory archaeological survey work began in February 2022 and will take a few weeks to complete. It is then expected that Bloor Homes will begin the permitted development during this year that will take 18/24 months to complete.

The open space typology as illustrated by the map will be seen to be spacious and

attractive with over half the site a combination of community woodland, amenity and semi natural open green space. There will also be a children's play area.

The Housing map of 59 market homes and 39 Social / Affordable homes illustrates the layout and housing types as follows; 39 Affordable / Social housing (The provider TBC)

#### 59 Market homes

4 x 2 bed bungalows 4 x 2 bed house 30 x 3 bed houses 21 x 4 bed houses ( of which 5 will be for custom build) 10 x 1 bed maisonette 10x 2 bed maisonette 1x 2 bed Bungalow 8 x 2 bed semis 9 x 3 bed semis 1 x 4 bed house It is anticipated 10 will be for shared ownership

Wollaston folk and those with Wollaston connections will have priority allocation followed by those registered from nearby villages such as Bozeat and Grendon. More details of social housing criteria can be found by downloading "Your guide to using Keyways" from the NNC website.

There will be a mix of stone faced and various brick faced houses. The two streets within the development will be known as Hollowell Street and Sumner Grove.

The following index linked developer contributions have been agreed they will be legally binding once the S106 is signed;

**£348,000** Early years funding to be allocated towards a new build pre-school and Community Hall

£340,000 Senior School facilities

£21,000 Wollaston Library

**£50,000** Health care facilities

**£136,000** Additional playing pitches and improvement to existing pitches

**£53,000** Sports Hall facilities ( to be used towards a new build Community Hall) **£36,000** Allotments

**£25,000** To be added to the existing fund to eventually provide a Wollaston to Irchester cycle track

2 hectares of Woodland

1 hectares of open green space on site

**0.3 hectares** land off site for building a new Community Hall and Preschool.

The above funds will become available at various stages of the development as

specified in the S106 legal agreement.



The 0.3 hectares of land will be allocated from Duchy land off Irchester Road opposite the school and behind Francis Dickins Close. The first stage will be for an architect to be appointed to prepare plans for the proposed Preschool and Community Hall for the Parish Council and Village Hall Committee to approve. The plans and layout will also need to be approved by the Local Education Authority of North Northants Council and planning permission will be sought from the Local planning Authority. Prior to the planning application stage, a full costing and funding of the project will be undertaken with all details presented to residents for community consultation. www.wollastontogether.co.uk

Do you remember when 'Climate Change' was what you went on your hols to Spain



for, the 'Greenhouse Effect' was what made your seedlings really perky and a 'Carbon Footprint' was something that Santa left on your carpet after coming down your chimney?! Sadly, these terms now have altogether more urgent and alarming meanings which are no joke and we can't ignore.

Wollaston's Green Initiative was born on the back of COP26 last year (the UN Climate Change Conference in Glasgow). With various grants available, a small group was set up to come up with ideas and a vision of bringing Wollaston up to date with green issues and ways to make our community and environment more sustainable and climate friendly. The bureaucracy of grant applications is tedious and slow but there are many, many things that can be instigated for free with just a little bit of time commitment and thought.

We thought we'd start by raising awareness of the recycling opportunities available within the village already but which people may not know about. The eagle eyed might already have spotted our Green Initiative 'Planet Earth' logo in the Co-op and library window. We are delighted to be collaborating with Dan the Co-op manager to promote their 'soft plastic re-cycling scheme'. Did you know you can take all your soft plastic bags and wrappers (that can't go in our green re-cycling bins) to the Co-op and they will recycle them? There is a surprisingly long list in the Co-op window of what is accepted so don't delay – do it today! The Co-op also has a used battery recycling box. Also, did you know that the library is a collection point for empty blister packs of pills/tablets? So don't throw you pill packets away – collect them up and drop them off at the library – simple! Over the coming weeks we will be promoting other recycling options that are available on our doorstep.

These are just a couple of examples of simple ways we, as a community, can do our bit to reduce landfill and make our environment that bit cleaner. Of course, there are many, many more ways we can all do our bit (and not just recycling) so keep a look out for our 'Wollaston's Green Initiative' logo that will be popping up to give you some green ideas. Hello Everyone and how lovely it is to be part of the first edition of our new village magazine.

WABIK, now in it's 6<sup>th</sup> Year has continued to thrive and evolve with your fantastic support. We are a community Project and constituted group and also part of the Good Neighbours Scheme run by Action for Communities in Rural England. We have a wonderful Committee who have enabled it to continue to serve the people of Wollaston and Bozeat. We have three aims –

To help those in Financial or emotional crisis, To build community, To save items from landfill and help to prevent food waste.

We mainly operate through our Facebook page – Wollaston And Bozeat Is Kind, we also keep in touch with many of our older members through a phone line. If you are on Facebook, please do join to see what we are doing.

At Christmas, over 100 children received Christmas presents chosen by their parents at our Gift event held. On December 19<sup>th</sup>, 74 elderly residents received a hot dinner cooked by The Wollaston Inn , paid for by our members and delivered by volunteers. Once again we worked with The Salvation Army and Wollaston School so that 19 households received beautiful hampers for Christmas. We were also able to ensure that 7 households in food poverty received a food voucher. We are continually overwhelmed by everyone's generosity. We are planning for our annual Kindness Day on Easter Saturday where many houses in both villages will receive a Random Act Of Kindness. We are very grateful to The Freemasons who have again pledged to donate Easter Eggs to families are struggling financially.

Our Foodbank is busy as many people struggle with the rising costs of living. We do not have a typical foodbank user, we have young people, those with children, those without, elderly, many who work and some who have lost their job due to illness – WABIK aims to provide a lifeline and not a lifestyle, so we offer food for four days up to four times in a three month period. From March 1<sup>st</sup>, our 'Leave if You Can – Take What You Need' table will be purely for food that would normally go to landfill and access to foodbank items will only be available through the foodbank on Tuesdays and Fridays. Please contact me if you need help.

There are three ways to donate to our foodbank and we are very grateful for all donations.

In the box provided in Wollaston CoOp , By leaving food in Viviene, the shed in my garden, or through our Amazon Wish List.

We would like to thank Alison Allen and Lianne Betteridge who have stepped down from our WABIK Committee after one year of fantastic appreciated service. Lianne worked very hard setting up our Bank Account and put a lot of important measures in place as well as supporting many of our elderly and those who were struggling to provide Birthday presents. Alison worked very hard helping elderly members and supporting the Foodbank. We welcome Cassie and Stevie who are our new Bozeat Members and look forward to working with them. We hope to be welcoming more new members at our AGM on 10<sup>th</sup> March. Finally, Thank You to everyone who makes WABIK work, it simply would not exist without you.

## WOLLASTON CRICKET CLUB



Refurbished Clubhouse & New Facilities. During the early part of January 2021 heavy storms caused problems to many villages around Northamptonshire and along with other cricket clubs we were in the firing line. At one stage the whole field was under water - including the clubhouse along with the enclosed net facility at the far end, adjacent to the bypass.

However, thanks to our insurers who covered the cost, we gradually refurbished the clubhouse, and by the end of the season it was up and running as before the flood. The nets were not so straight forward. The heavy amount of standing water on the site was so severe that as well as damaging the surface it had penetrated the foundations, and after close inspection it was deemed unsafe and not fit for purpose. Replacing it was a daunting prospect but fortunately our insurance covered a third of the cost with the remainder being funded by the England & Wales Cricket Board who also guided us through the necessary procedures. Thanks are due to both parties and we now have a fantastic state of the art replacement which should prove invaluable now and, in the future, and is possibly one of the best in the area. It is longer and wider than the previous net and contains three lanes with extended run-ups and many safety features. Electricity power points will also allow bowling machines to be utilised when necessary.

With three senior teams and a thriving youth and junior section which accommodates youngsters from the ages of five to nineteen, the facility should prove a real asset to our club Wollaston - and surrounding villages, giving our coaches every opportunity to guide, coach and advise our members in a safe environment.

We held our virtual AGM in early February and all three captains were re-elected for 2022.Harry Broome will lead the First team, Nathan Dawson the Seconds and Darren Laughton the Thirds. Our senior coaches will once again be Neal Perry and Nick Broome.

The first round of matches on Saturday April 30th will see our First team travelling to Old Northamptonian 2nds, our Second team at home to Horton House, while our Thirds entertain Weldon at Emberton. Starting times are 11am, 12pm and again 12pm respectively.


