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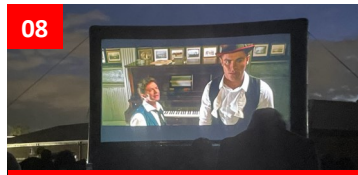
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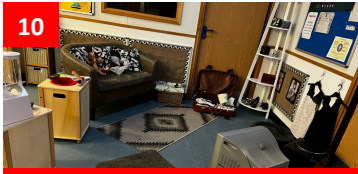

A Short History of Wollaston Playing Fields.

This first part of the story is somewhat lost in the mists of time, but it is indicative of the random nature of the provision of facilities around villages in the past and we should all be grateful for the forethought and kindness of individuals from the past.

When Wollaston Cricket Club [WCC] left their ground in Scott Bader in the 1920s, a local farmer, called Billy Gibbard allowed part of one of his fields [the present Playing Fields] to be used for cricket by WCC and a year later, the other half for football by Wollaston Victoria Football Club [WVFC]. However, it appears he did not own the land and some years later, perhaps after his death, the Parish Council then acquired this land from the Duchy of Lancaster [essentially the Crown] for the benefit of villagers for recreation.

When the Wollaston by-pass was built in the 1980s, the shape of the field changed from rectangular to the present shape with a triangular piece of land being lost from the Strixton corner and extra land was gained, where the copse was planted behind the cricket nets.

Various buildings have come and gone over the years; however, the present Sports Association Pavilion was built in 2003 to replace four existing structures, which had become somewhat dilapidated.

So, how is the Playing Field managed? The Parish Council [PC] is responsible overall and the Playing Fields Committee has members from the PC, WCC, WVFC and junior football club. Wollaston Sports Association [WSA] leases the present building from the PC.

Much of the work on the Playing Field is done by volunteers for no financial reward. I feel that the Playing Fields are a wonderful asset to the village for anyone to enjoy. You could be down there alone on a warm May morning, sitting on a bench, watching a red kite drift around, watching a football match

on a bracing winter day or a cricket match on a hot August evening with a cool drink from the bar. Also, following the success of the Queen's Jubilee celebrations, the newly formed events committee intend to organise annual entertainment days on the Playing Field on a regular basis.

Parish Council Budget

The 7% increase in the Parish Council budget figures represents a 48p per month (Band D properties) increase to reflect inflationary increases with all Parish Council expenditure plus an additional contribution towards the initial charges and architectural fees associated in establishing the viability of a once in a lifetime opportunity to build a new community hall and preschool. "

Plans for the project will be presented to the community for consultation once complete.

In December, the Parish Council lost two Councillors. John Tyrell left the Council as he no longer lives in Wollaston and David Tew had to step down for health reasons. I would like to take this opportunity to tell you a little about these Councillors and the responsibilities that they undertook within the Parish Council.

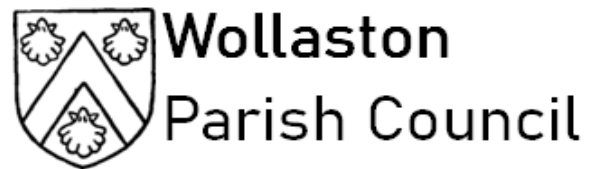


John Tyrell was elected to the Council in 2007 and served as an active since then. Being re-elected three times. John's main role was to support the Parish Clerk with the Council's accounting and

also to ensure that payments were correct and sign off the reconciled monthly accounts. He was relied upon for his ability to remain objective and give a well thought out response to issues raised at Parish Council meetings.

Outside of his Parish responsibilities, John set up and managed a successful engineering supplies business, operating from offices initially in Wollaston. The success of the business meant that John had to find larger premises and these were located away from Wollaston and so after a period of time, John decided to move closer to the business and so stepped down from his role in the Parish Council. Some of you might also be aware that John is an avid balloonist, and was often seen launching his balloon from the playing fields. I am sure that you will all join with me in thanking John for his service to Wollaston, and wish him all the best in his new home.

The other Councillor who stepped down is **David Tew**. David did not serve on the Council as long as John did but, but was very active in the local Community always listening



to residents' concerns. He worked with North Northants Council's Highways Dept. to ensure that the village is maintained, to as high a standard as possible. In this he was aided by other Councillors on the Parish Council Highways Team who monitor the state of the roads, hedgerows, street lights and foot paths. David became very ill a few months back and has reluctantly stepped down as due to illness he is no longer able to be proactive in the ongoing village improvements that he championed. In fact, it was following a major road traffic accident on the A509 that David managed to get the Highways Dept to agree a 40 mile per hour speed restriction on the A09. This speed restriction zone covered the road from before York Road to just past London Road around the Cobbs Lane/A509 roundabout and, along with the ANPR Cameras posted along the A509, will help to reduce speeding traffic and control criminal activity across county lines.

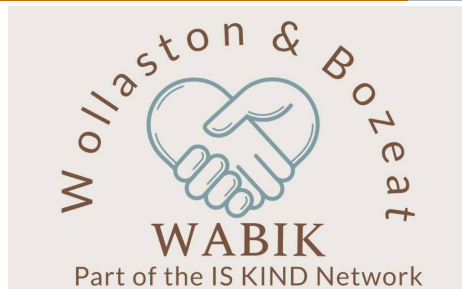
Wollaston And Bozeat Is Kind has continued to be busy and as always, the committee are overwhelmed by the huge amount of support we have received

📍 The meaning of play at Wollaston & Strixton Pre-school 📍

Children need to develop proprioception and vestibular sense via adventurous play. This then assists them in learning to listen, focus and follow directions. Children with healthy neurological systems naturally seek out the sensory input they need on their own.



Children's ability to move and play are being restricted more than ever. We are trying to protect them by saying 'no climbing,' 'no running,' 'no spinning, "that's too dangerous,' and 'get down from there!' However, research shows that the drastic decline in risky outdoor play in children is creating behavior problems. By constantly hovering over children, restricting their movement, and diminishing their time to play, we are causing more harm than good.

We have had a very exciting few weeks at the primary school since Christmas which has involved lots of visitors to make the children's learning really exciting. We were visited by Nick from Primary Workshops who came and delivered a two-day workshop on how we can use recycled materials in order to make instruments. This fed in really nicely to children's mental health week as it really demonstrated how music can be used to feel settled and well in a stressful situation. All of the children from Reception to Year 6 were involved and the feedback we received from the children was amazing.



In Key Stage One and Reception we were also lucky enough to be able to have a visit from the 'Animal Encounters Experience. This linked in with the children's work on animals in science. The children were very excited to be able to hold a range of reptiles and animals and learn all about their habitats and what they need to survive etc.

Across the rest of the school the children have all been working really hard as we head towards the spring term. A special recognition goes to Year 6 as some of them have given up their half term holidays in order to come into school and complete some booster sessions ready for their SATS tests in May. We are really proud of the effort all of our children have put in since September particularly and also a big thanks



goes to the teachers who work tirelessly to give each child the best.



As we head towards spring and summer we look forward to celebrating as a school King Charles III coronation in May. A historic occasion for all of us to enjoy as many of us in school have never had the chance to experience this before. We are also looking forward to taking part in the Big Sing at the Dergate in March and singing with all of the other INMAT Schools.

RAG Week 2023

At Wollaston every year the sixth form dedicate one week to putting on events for the whole school in order to raise money for charities. RAG week is organised by the sixth form student leaders and they all come together to contribute towards the week in their own ways. The leaders encourage all members of the sixth form to contribute in one way or another and there was a great reception to this. The charities vary every year and are selected by the senior students. This year young minds was chosen to be one of the charities as well as the British Heart Foundation and finally the Gossett Ward at Northampton General Hospital. All of these charities having a connection to the school in one way or another, making it special for all that donate towards RAG week. Our end goal was to raise £2,500.

This year there was a special enthusiasm for the daily fancy dress, with a different theme for each of the five days and the students never failing to be creative with their outfits. The themes include Safari , what job you wanted to be when you were younger or even to the current day , Heroes VS Villains , British Icons and our old Wollaston School Uniform. Everyone in the Sixth form including the staff dressed up every day. It was always entertaining to see the creative ideas that all the students had, with some going all out and others doing group costumes. to see the entertainment is always an option, and many were happy to contribute towards the week's final total.. Some shorted activities took place break time which were just as successful as those at lunch. 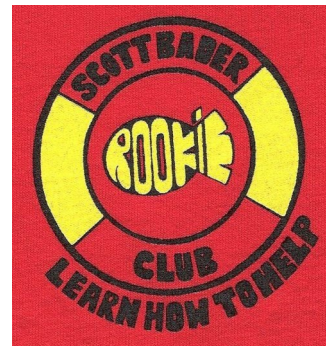

There is a one off joining fee of £15, for which the new ROOKIE will receive a specially designed ROOKIE shirt, folder and leaflets.

The Monthly fee is £15.00 per child, which is used to buy equipment and sponsor additional activities such as open water activities – Wind surfing, Kayaking, sailing, and raft races. We also have other activities

throughout the year, scuba diving, bowling and visiting the local Christmas Panto.

The club is run by volunteers who have a combination of qualifications and ALL have Police clearance to work with children.

The Scott Bader ROOKIE Club is run for competent swimmers on a Wednesday evening between 7 – 8.00 pm in the Company Swimming pool.

What's new on Disney+? Marvel's gut-retching and tangible representation of grief and dealing with loss in their latest film – Black Panther: Wakanda Forever. More than just another superhero movie



Marvel's second instalment in the Black Panther series directed by Ryan Coogler is one of their most tear-jerking films yet. The film came to Disney + on the 1st of February depicting grieving sister, Shuri coping with the loss her brother after he succumbed to an unnamed illness, highlighting the immense power of grief. Not only was the loss of such a loved and popular character shattering for audiences, but it was also accompanied by the crushing death of Chadwick Boseman, who played the previous Black Panther – King T'Challa. The actor died on the 28th of August in 2020 from colon cancer- shocking and devastating fans across the globe.



The film was formidable in its execution of tributing Boseman- honouring his memory as the talented and charismatic performer he was while simultaneously remembering his contribution to the role of Black Panther which brought so much life and personality to the first instalment. Along with such a heartfelt tribute, Marvel's Black Panther: Wakanda Forever combines stellar special effects, an action-packed plot, hilarious

moments of comedy which lifted the dominant sombre themes without detracting their importance and performances from: Letitia Wright (Shuri), Angela Bassett (Ramonda), Lupita Nyong'o (Nakia), and Danai Gurira (Okoye) all of which have raised the standard of Marvel movies.



Marvel has created a story which all viewers can relate to. Grief to many families is a familiar concept – especially after the global pandemic. Marvel's Black Panther not only portrays this immense feeling with thoughtful and careful consideration, but it also highlights a very important message to its audience in the face of losing a loved one. Perseverance and allowing yourself to feel the pain so it does not consume you. Not only is this important in normalising the intense feelings of grief many would find themselves feeling, it also encourages those to reach out and seek support from those around which in light of the growing epidemic of mental health issues is absolutely vital.

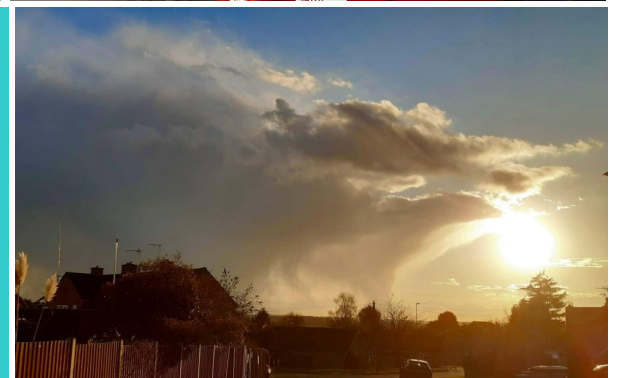
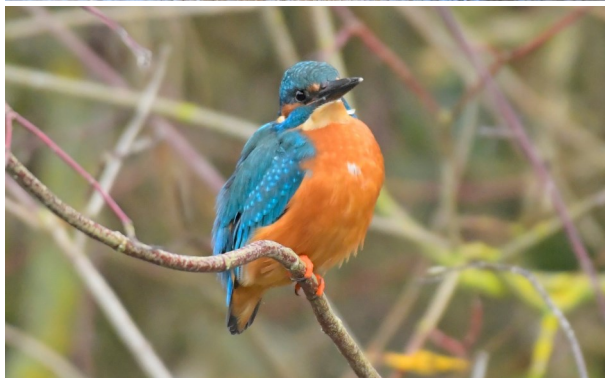

A sad end to an English summer day



The 21st of June 1941 was a warm and sunny English summer day. The previous few weeks had been windy and wet with low temperatures, more akin to Spring than the onset of Summer but that all changed on the 21st.

The Avro Manchester bombers of 207 Squadron RAF sat on their dispersals at RAF Waddington, South West of Lincoln. The crews had finished a light supper and had then been transported to the aircraft that had been recently inspected by their ground crews and fully “bombed up”

The sky was not yet dark, after all it was the longest day, and the outside temperature was warm, but the experienced crews made sure that they were warmly dressed and had all the personal equipment they would need for the flight, before climbing into the trucks which would take them to the dispersal area and their aircraft. The crews climbed into their individual aircraft, the crew of Avro Manchester L7314 (Y), led by their youthful skipper Flying Officer Jackie Withers. Just after 01.00 am on the morning of the 22nd June 1941, the still of the night was shattered by the noise of 14 Rolls Royce Vulture engines as the seven Manchesters of 207 squadron rolled along the taxiway to the main runway and line astern took off into the darkening sky.

The target tonight for No 5 Bomber Group was Boulogne, and seven Manchester bombers of 207 squadron were tasked along with crews from 97 and 61 squadrons, with the attack on the port and shipping in the harbour.

There was a waning moon that night, perfect for a bomber offensive, and after a miserable introduction to service life, Bomber Command

had decided on a target well within the range of the Avro Manchester aircraft and should have been a straightforward “milk run” and a morale boost for the crews.

Flying Officer Withers was 21 years old, a contemporary of Guy Gibson, he joined 83 squadron at RAF Scampton when Gibson was a Flight Commander, was an experienced bomber pilot for all his youth, was outbound on track at around 6000 feet, German aircraft were active over Lincolnshire and one, which was being tracked by the Lincolnshire Air Observer Corps, by chance, followed a course overlapping that of L7314 (Y).

No 10 Group Fighter Command had scrambled a number of night fighters, including airborne interception radar-equipped Bristol Beaufighters from 25 squadron at RAF Wittering to counter the threat posed by the German intruders. The Fighter Controller at 10 Group was homing one of these aircraft along the presumed track of the intruder and when the two tracks crossed the Beaufighter was mistakenly homed onto the track of L7314 (Y).



In addition to this mischance, another was to contribute to the events of the next few minutes. No 5 Group’s operations plan for the night, giving times and routes etc. had gone via Bomber Command to Fighter Command, arriving at 10 Group Headquarters just at the time of the change of controllers.

The new controller had received the operations plan, but it had become covered

by other papers on his desk and the details within it had not been extracted and placed on the operations board. Consequently the controller had no information before him to indicate the presence of friendly aircraft at the vital location. Accordingly, the controller homed the fighter onto the 'hostile' until, in the darkness, the pilot was able to gain a visual on the aircraft ahead.

Squadron personnel believe that what happened next was that the Beaufighter pilot identified the aircraft as an RAF bomber and relayed this to the controller, who was unwilling to accept this identification. Cautiously, the Beaufighter moved closer, recognising roundel markings and RAF squadron codes in pale letters on the fuselage. The bomber crew had also seen the fighter for they fired off the correct codes of the day. This was passed to the ground station, where the controller still insisted that the aircraft was a hostile and instructed the pilot to complete the interception and shoot the aircraft down.



Although in two minds, the Beaufighter pilot dropped back before finally closing in again beneath the Manchester, still flying slowly and straight and level, and giving it a burst with the fixed forward cannon and machine guns. Shards of Perspex from the Manchester, along with a Perspex dome and an airman's glove were found in a field by Crow Hill Farm near Irthlingborough. This debris hint at damage in the cockpit area. Further fragments were found in the playground of College Street School in Irthlingborough itself. A second

burst of fire was seen by observers on the ground as Withers overflew Chester House on the A45, leading to the Manchester catching fire.



Flying Officer Withers had no time to jettison bombs or fuel, and none of the crew escaped by parachute. The captain then accomplished an exemplary belly landing in a field at Lovett's Farm just to the east of Shepherds Hill in Wollaston at about 01.55 am. Several crew members began scrambling from the burning wreck but unfortunately part of the bomb load exploded and no-one survived.

The next day only traces of five separate bodies and the identity disc of Sergeant James the second pilot, could be found in the burnt out wreckage of L7314 (Y). This tragedy took the lives of Flying Officer J D G Withers, Sergeant A M James, Sergeant W Brown DFM, Sergeant A Malone, Sergeant S Veitch, Sergeant M V Browne and Sergeant J A Maville RCAF.

It was a tragic mistake which should never have happened and for which safeguards were in place, yet under the stress of war, such human errors were likely. It was no consolation to the crew of L7314 (Y) that the crew of the Beaufighter Pilot Officers Smith and Lusty were later Court Martialled and a portion of the blame was also allocated to the ground station.

Finally, on the same night a German Ju88 intruder was shot down by a 25 squadron Beaufighter near Market Deeping.

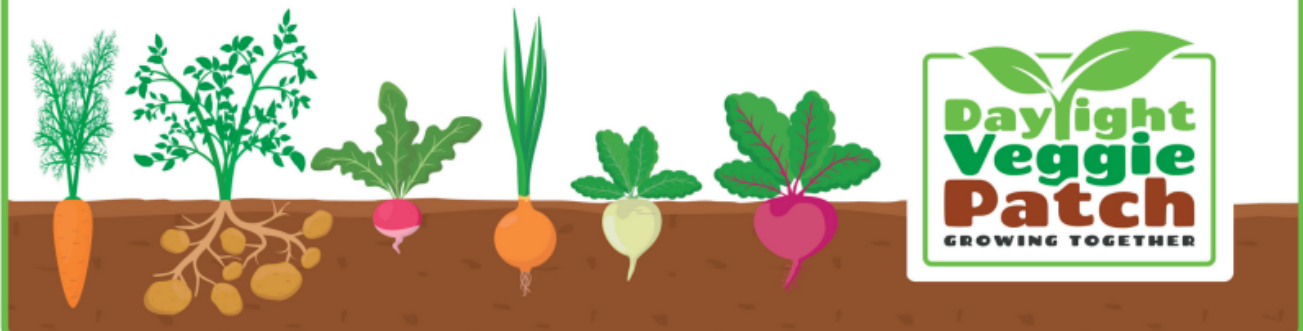

Bernard Smart's memories by Phil Smart

My father, Bernard Smart, was well known in the village, mainly as the Managing Director of the Wollaston Vulcanizing Company. In earlier times he had taken over his father's share in Humphrey & Smart (Boots) Ltd. Later he would be Bill Griggs' right hand man during the introduction of Doc Martens boots. After he retired in 1984, Bernard started work on a book. He had only completed about half of it when he passed away in 2001 but what he had written is interesting and covers his childhood and much of his involvement in Wollaston's boot and shoe industry. We begin with his earliest memories:

I was born at No 4 Newton Road, the centre of a block of three council houses built under a 1919 Act of Parliament, since demolished to make way for flats. Houses of a similar pattern were built in the area. There is a row in Broadway, Wellingborough and a pair up Eastfield Road. The house did have a bathroom, quite an innovation in those days, with hot and cold running water. The hot was provided from a gas geyser. These could be deadly devices. In fact, my father, during the war, helped to rescue a lad from a similar bath who had been overcome by gas. My father's second wife's husband had died from the same cause.

The Freestones lived at No. 2 and came from Finedon and the Robbins at No 6 came from Aylesbury. So we were the only locals living in the block. Mr. Freestone was a Co-op insurance rep. and had a belt driven Motor bike. Mr Robbins drove a small petrol tanker. I think he got the sack for smoking in the cab. The Freestones had two children,

Jean and Jack; the Robbins had Barbara and Wesley. We were Phyllis and Bernard. The girls being older than the boys in each case. I was born on Monday 27th August 1923, Jack was born on the 29th and Art Silsby across the way in Howard Road on the 31st. The Midwife must have had quite a busy week.

I mention Art because we three grew up together and his back yard was as good a place to play as any. That is when we were not playing in the street. They had a Jack Russel called Daisy and a ferret. I think father Tom, although a Tapper by trade, was also a bit of a poacher. The story goes that one evening he took the ferret down to Williams the Butchers in St Michaels Lane, pushed it through the half open window on a piece of string and pulled it out attached to a string of sausages. I don't think the relationship with the Underwoods was particularly good, not helped on firework night when Art put a Halfpenny Demon under their dustbin lid. When it went off the lid was lifted about ten feet into the air and came clattering down on to the brick yard. By the time Mrs Underwood came out we had long since gone.
