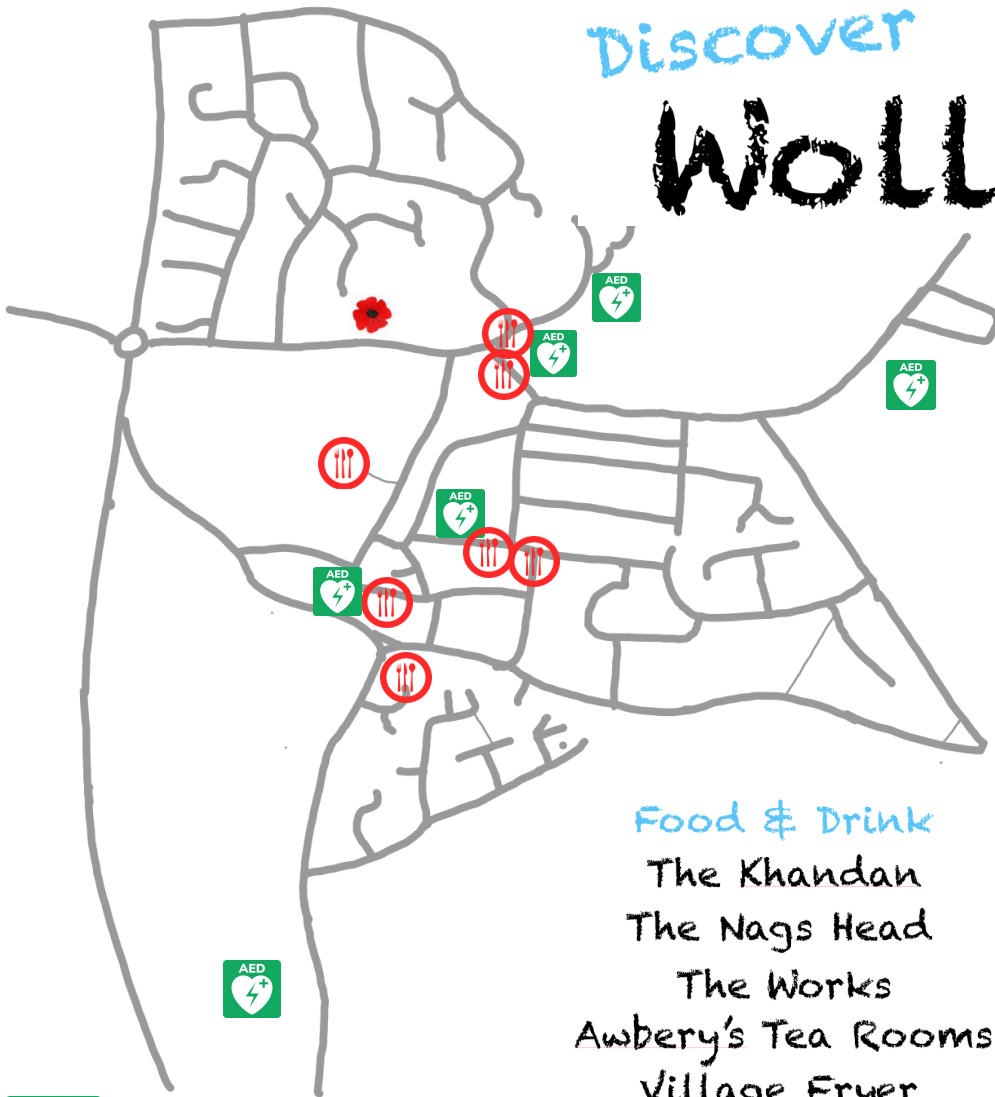

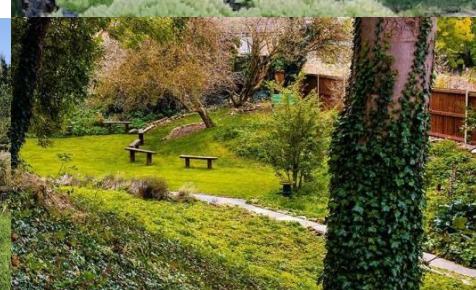

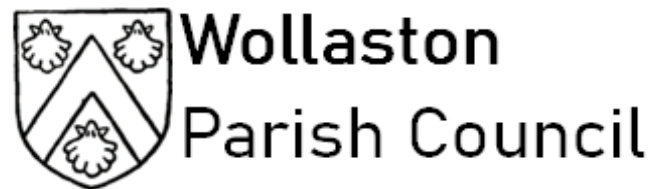

As many residents of the Village may know, the Parish Council have been working for the last four years on the potential development of a new Community Hall and Preschool. This came about because of the offer by the Duchy of Lancaster of land in Irchester Road next to Francis Dickens Close. This offer was made as a gesture of goodwill because the land in Hookhams Path being developed by Bloor Homes was containing more houses than the Neighbourhood Plan recommended, and the Duchy wanted to help the village by providing separate land for the New Hall.

Unfortunately, the ambitious plans of the Wollaston Village Hall Management Committee supported by the Parish Council have now been unable to be followed because the Health and Safety Executive (HSE) have stated in their latest review that this location is unsafe and unusable for a Pre-School and Community Hall because of its location within the High Risk Zone areas of Scott Bader chemical factory which is adjacent to this land.

We have inspected other areas near Hookhams Path offered by the Duchy in lieu of the unusable original location but none of these are suitable for our Community Hall because they are very hilly and are too far from the centre of the Village. So, for these reasons we have been prevented from designing and building the new Hall and we have had to revert to our plans for redevelopment of the existing Village Hall. This new plan will include a partial extra first floor and lift and also a permanent area for the Pre-school (Busy Bees) which will give them an all-day attendance capacity which they could not have in the current Village Hall due to lack of free space all day. This will help both the residents of our village with being able to put their young children in preschool all day so that both parents can work during the day and it will also give much more facilities in the Village Hall for people hiring space in the Hall.



Our current Village Hall was constructed in 1966 and is in need of extension and redevelopment. We are now concentrating on designing the new development including more parking facilities and we are hoping to begin the Planning process with North Northamptonshire Council in the next few weeks. Our hope is to get the redevelopment finished as soon as possible and hopefully within the next year from now. We are in the process of obtaining gifts and grants to finance this but the Parish Council will also help to finance this development as it is the owner of the building whilst the Management Committee which runs the Village Hall is a well-established Charity.

We all hope that our residents will be pleased that we are keeping our Village Hall in the centre of the Village and that we are trying our best to improve the hall considerably by making it both bigger and updated. We also hope that we can successfully raise the money required for this project and we are confident that we will successfully raise the sufficient finance required.. A huge amount of work has been done by the members of the Sub Committee which is led by me and I am most grateful to my Fellow Councillors and Members of the Village Hall Management Committee for the work they have already put in and will continue to put into this exciting project which will ensure that our Village will have a bigger and brighter Community Hall.

Cadent's film focusing on Bedfordshire homelessness charity reaches finals of national Charity Film Awards!

Bedfordshire homelessness charity Emmaus Village Carlton is celebrating after a film it features in has reached the finals of The Smiley Movement's Charity Film Awards. The film titled 'Safe & Warm - Cadent Foundation's Support for the Emmaus Community' has been shortlisted in the 2024 Charity Film Awards in The Big Issue Corporate Cause category.

The charitable arm of Cadent, the UK's largest gas distribution network, commissioned the film featuring companion Christian Coley, who spoke about his own experience of homelessness and how Emmaus has helped to transform his life.

Emmaus Village Carlton supports people with a home, individual support and work experience for as long as they need it. Residents, known to the charity as companions, gain skills and confidence with work opportunities in the community's three charity shops and bistro.



thrilled and delighted to be finalists in The Smiley Movement's Charity Film Awards. This is all testament to the wonderful Cadent Foundation for their incredible ongoing support of our charity and for commissioning this powerful film.

Created for a fundraising golf tournament, the film outlines how Cadent Foundation provided £36,500 of roofing insulation at Emmaus Village Carlton, £24,000 worth of new windows for Emmaus Mossley and £1,750 for a new door at Emmaus Salford.

It was created for Cadent Foundation by Acquis Media, who entered it into the annual Charity Film Awards run by The Smiley Movement, an organisation that helps non-profit organisations and charities engage more effectively with the public.



Lorna Milliken, Managing Director of The Smiley Movement said: "To be a finalist is a great testament to the enthusiasm of your effectiveness of your film. Well done!

"The response to the awards has been overwhelming. In this record-breaking campaign, over 500 films were entered and we've seen a 50% increase on public votes so far for the UK charity/CIC/social enterprise categories in comparison with last year at this stage."

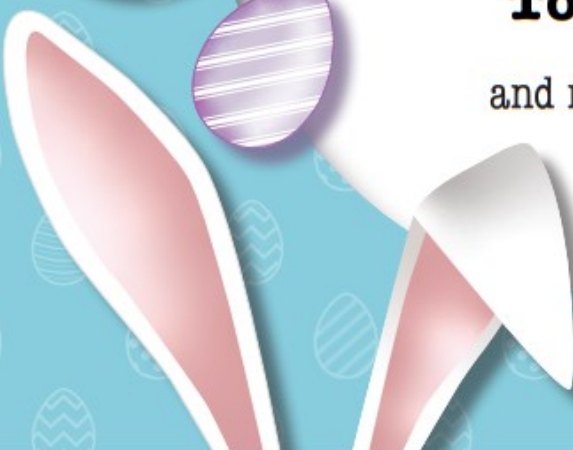

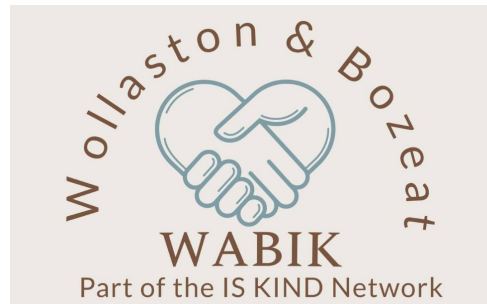

Hello everybody

Busy Bees has been very busy as we went into 2024.

The children are still enjoying their visits to the Daylight Veggie Patch. This half term we have been exploring bugs and looking at birds. The children have used magnifying glasses to look at creatures close up and identifying parts of a worm, (sometimes getting the top and bottom end a little muddled up)! We have also been bird watching and marking the birds we see on a record sheet. We have explored growing garlic, having toasted crumpets on the fire and making faces in salt dough.

“Going on a Bear Hunt” is still one of their favourite stories, and our walk round the village takes us through the long grass, in the squishy squashy mud and through the cold stream!! We cannot describe the squeals of delight coming from their little voices when jumping in the muddy puddles!

In the pre-school setting, we have been exploring more cooking activities, like making bread, cakes, fruit salad and soup. These activities can encourage lots of language and communication skills as well as fine motor development. We can make them simpler for younger children and more complicated for those who are ready. This has been valuable to ensuring Maths language is frequently used in our setting whilst varying it to the children’s needs. Cooking will be a weekly activity involving varied recipes and skills.

More recently, we have completed our DIY SOS revamp on the pre-school garden. We cleaned the mud kitchen, weeded the plant area, created a new bug and growing area, created a huge imaginary area of tyres, crates and planks, made a water wall, a music wall, a bolts and locks wall, tidied the sand shed, made an artist board and a loose parts wall. It is an absolutely massive achievement from the staff, parents, volunteers and committee. It looks absolutely amazing and we cannot wait to show the children tomorrow!

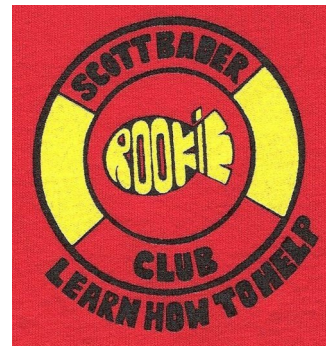

With the wet and grubby weather we have had lately I thought a happy story would be welcome.

Our 5th Dogs For Good Puppy Arlo has passed his final assessment with his Client and is now settled in their home making a huge difference to not only her life but her family and friends lives as well. In the last magazine he had just qualified as a DFG assistance dog and was to be paired with a client,

Arlo is living with a 16 year old wheelchair bound young girl, who has multiple disabilities, in the future the young girl would like to go to University and with Arlo by her side she will have so much more confidence, with a handsome friendly Goldie by her side people will see her as more than someone in wheelchair that they feel awkward about approaching, people will go up and ask about the dog and what he does and that's how friendships begin.

Some of the things that Arlo does for the young girl are to pick up things she has dropped, fetch items such as crutches, help her get undressed, open doors for her, and raise and lower the wheelchair foot rests, plus lots more. Also she will have to go outside to exercise him (Arlo loves his free time, a photo of him playing is shown) giving her the confidence to engage with her local community.

The young girl has been teaching Arlo tasks herself, she has taught him to carry a basket so that when she is upstairs and wants a drink she can give Arlo the basket, he trots downstairs and goes to her mother, her mother puts a bottle of water in it and Arlo takes it back upstairs.

Arlo was a smart puppy when he came to us at 8 weeks, he was bred by one of our volunteer brood holders, from stock that has been researched by our puppy team. For the first 8 weeks with us we took him to as many places as we could in a puppy bag, it is important to get show your pup as much info and experiences as you can before they are 16 weeks old. For a lot of that time they haven't been fully vaccinated and have to be carried,

let me assure you that they are heavy lumps, but is worth the effort.

From 8 weeks until he was 20 months old he lived with us and we took him everywhere that we went, we did all his basic obedience and attended regular puppy classes, he is a cheeky lovable chap who loves to learn so he was a joy to have around. At 20 months he left us for Training at the DFG centre in Banbury. He lived with a B&B boarder for the 16 weeks or so that he took to train by one of our wonderful trainers.



A B&B Boarder is someone who lives near the centre and who might work so they cannot have a dog of their own, on this scheme they drop pup off at the Centre on their way to work and pick them up on the way home, they have the benefit of a dog for the evenings and weekends.

Towards the end of Arlo's training the training team would look at his skills and their list of potential clients to match him to. He would then visit a client for a day to see if they clicked and then the training team would make a decision as to if he was suitable. So there is the tale of Arlo.

Riley our current pup is doing fantastically, he's so calm and willing, he will be going for his Assessment week at the end of the month and then he will go training around May time.

Opening of the new cricket pavilion - 5th May 1937 (from Barry Robinson's book)

Bernard continues: Coming into Wollaston from Bozeat, at the bottom of the hill on the left was, and still is, the cricket field. Now it is also a recreation ground, complete with football pitch and tennis courts. Then it was cricket only. The field was lent to the village by Farmer Gibbard. I think that the village would have liked to have bought the field but in those days the Duchy hung on to it's land and it wasn't until after World War 2 that the village could acquire it.

Many tales could be told by the old cricketers, mostly lost in the mists of time. Each side supplied an umpire and it was not unknown for him to give his own players out L.B.W. if it was getting too close to pub opening time.

Over the bridge on the right is what used to be Walter Willis's small-holding. He grew vegetables for selling at the shop he had built at the bottom of Queen Street; we called it that but it became Queens Road when they put street signs up. Above Walter's field used to be the Pyghtle garden-field. Uncle Billy Brawn had a fairly large greenhouse on this allotment. He grew tomatoes as well as bedding plants and eventually built a brand new greenhouse in the Co-op garden-field where he was able to buy two plots instead of renting.

On the opposite side was the white gate leading to the cricket field. Someone in the village must have had a monopoly to make and paint white gates; you would find them at the entrances to all of the garden-fields, including Dartmoor which had two, one off Hookhams Path and the other off Hinwick Road. The Manchester allotment that used to be on the right at the bottom of Cobbs Lane had one as did the Oddfellows ground South of Hinwick Road. At the bottom of the cricket field you crossed the brook by a wooden plank bridge, a footpath to the left led to the cricket pavilion, but straight on was the field way to Grendon. To get there you went up the hill, past the rather large dew pond called the Moat, across the only street in Strixton, through another gate and on to Grendon.

To get to the cricket ground you had to walk on the public footpath through a field of buttercups; if you left the path your boots would be covered in the bright yellow pollen from these flowers. Towards the bottom on the left you could often find quite a few mushrooms, only picked once because invariably you got diarrhoea and someone would say "I know where you got those mushrooms from"!
