Stories of Wollaston

Instead of sharing an old story about Wollaston in this edition, I wanted to share something that's happening now. A story that in 40/50 years time people will look back and say this is a memorable story about Wollaston, a story that is worth telling and never forgetting. Since the War in Ukraine began, untold misery and despair has been thrusted upon many Ukrainians, and as it always does Wollaston rose to the challenge to help in any way we could. The story in this edition will focus on how a small rural village, one thousand five hundred and seventy miles away from Ukraine has helped those fleeing the brutal consequences of war. This is not a story of tragedy, rather a story of hope!

St Mary's Church

When the war started, the church community started collecting items to be sent to Ukraine via a church in Wellingborough. We also became aware of a number of families that had signed up to the government's Home for Ukrainians scheme and I have now set up a Facebook support group for host families in Wollaston and surrounding villages looking to sponsor a Ukrainian family. This is proving valuable for support through the process of getting families to the UK, and now that some families are arriving, for connecting families together. St. Mary's currently has one Ukrainian family regular attending on a Sunday and soon to have more. It is great that so many people in Wollaston are getting involved, being a host family, supporting host families and/or supporting financially via the DEC. A huge thanks also to all those who are flying Ukrainian flags, we are told this is so helpful in providing a good welcome to Ukrainian families.

Baptist Church

We held an afternoon tea and sale in April at the Baptist Church. We had quizzes and activities for children. We raised nearly £1500 which the Baptist church kindly matched, totalling to just under £3000.

WABIK

On Easter Saturday, WABIK held a Ukraine Kindness Day at Wollaston Village Hall. Hundreds of beautiful cakes, fantastic raffle prizes, over 200 tombola prizes, lovely plants, over 100 teddies, a whole room of clothes, crafts and refreshments were donated and the hall looked wonderful with blue and yellow bunting and flowers. The event was really well attended and we welcomed guests who had already arrived from Ukraine. Everyone worked really hard and a fantastic £2000 was donated to DEC UKRAINE FUND. Thank you to everyone who helped.

Julia's Story (Ukrainian Refugee)

Not everyone knows that the yellow of the Ukrainian flag symbolises wheat fields, and the blue symbolises the clear sky. Wheat fields are a symbol of the diligence of Ukrainians, the love and respect for bread and our land on which we love to work and feed the people of our country. The sky is a symbol of our peacefulness and purity of a broad soul. This is our spiritual wealth.

There have always been attempts to eradicate the Ukrainians as a nation. The authorities of other countries have always been interested in our fields, lands, all resources, the industriousness of our nation. We are indeed very rich and strong spiritually. They always wanted to conquer us in order to have power over our wealth, of our inner world and our lands. We gave a lot of strength, blood and lives to be independent. It is the 21st century and the world appreciates the freedom of people and democracy, but still we cannot be left alone. Many

centuries have passed, many generations have grown, but the national values and strength of the people are the same. We are ready to give our lives for our freedom and independence. I am proud to be Ukrainian.

Many of my close people did not leave the city because they were sure that no one would help. My friend, who is a single mother of two children, plus an orphan, lost 'Life will win over death, light will win over darkness'

'Життя переможе смерть, світло переможе темряву'

everything. With great doubts and fear she left her home without any money, but she was surprised that the world was not without good people. She would never have imagined that a citizen from the Republic of Belarus would help her, but such a man answered her post for help and used his own money to pay for accommodation. My friend has now settled in Sweden and is happy and grateful.

I am also making the journey with my fifteen-year-old daughter and two cats, and I will be arriving in Wollaston very soon. I hope that my message is read by the community because it is important for history that people know what is happening, and because it will give strength and inspiration to my people to know that we are heard and welcomed in the UK.



The Parish Council meets every month to go through the various business that crops up, including planning applications, police, finance, reports, correspondence and many other matters. We hope that everything we do is for the benefit of the village and have an open meeting at the start so that members of the public can come along and air any problem that may be affecting them. We would hope that if we cannot solve every problem we can at least, point someone in the right direction for a solution. As well as the monthly meetings each parish councillor is on a working party or committee which looks after a particular area of village life. These cover such areas as the Cemetery, Playgrounds, Playing Field, Street Lighting, Footpaths, Environment & Highways, Village Hall, Pocket Park, Community Safety and Youth Project.

My particular interests are in the street lighting, highways and playing fields within the village. In recent years the lamps have been upgraded to the latest energy saving white lights and while these give a brighter light unfortunately there are not quite so many of them as previous. Balfour Beatty who now administer the lights on behalf of NNC carried out this upgrade and if a light near you is out or giving problems please note its number and either call Balfour Beatty on 0800–0850257 or report via the North Northamptonshire Council website.

If there are other things you would like to report, for example: - pot-holes, blocked drains, broken kerbs, damaged signs, etc - you should contact the NNC on 0300–126 -3000 or Street Doctor via the website. If you report something to Street Doctor, you will be given a reference number which can be used to check the progress on your particular problem and chase up if necessary. So rather than just complain about this and that and why does the council not fix the other, be proactive and report it yourself.

I am also on the Playing Fields Committee and the village has been well served over the years by various people who have presided over and provided us with this wonderful asset for now and future generations. The sports clubs are thriving in the village at the moment, especially in the youth sections and a big thank you to all coaches and helpers who are helping to make this possible and enthusing the young. The village teams should be well served in future generations from this influx.

However we are still concerned at the amount of irresponsible dog owners who allow their dogs to foul on the field and do not bother to clear it up. It is after all a

playing field with many children about and sports being played, not a dog exercise area. We realise that many owners are responsible, but as in many walks of life, they are let down by the irresponsible few. This could also apply to the village as a whole and there is no excuse as the Council has had many dog bins put up recently.

Works have now started down Hookhams Path and the council has tried to negotiate the best outcome for village residents. While perhaps many of us would not like to see so much building in the village, at least we do get monies from the builders to enhance many aspects of village life. We have also been granted some land on which to hopefully build a new Community Hall to replace our ageing village hall. This has proved to be unable to upgrade due to planning problems and it seems an ideal time to invest in the building of a larger and more up to date hall for future generations.

We hope to see you at the next Council meeting perhaps, they are held on the third Thursday of each month starting at 7.00pm. The open meeting is at the very start, so you can air any problem and then leave soon after if you wish.

Step 1 - Password security

- ➤ Strong memorable passwords can easily be created by combining three random words. (eg. Trampoline%Sleepy%Dishwasher)
- ▶ Create new passwords for any toys, games, smart devices, etc. connected to the Internet.
- Never share passwords or on-screen codes with anyone no matter who they claim to be.
- ▶ Consider using a trusted Password Manager if you access multiple website accounts.
- ▶ Always make sure you use a different password for each account or site.

Step 2 - Extra account protection

- ▶ Two-factor authentication (2FA) adds an extra layer of security to your online account.
- ▶ Enable 2FA (via account settings) on each of your important accounts such as email, photo, shopping and social media sites.

Step 5 - Avoid online scams

- ▶ Do not click on links in any unverified emails, texts or other messages (eg. WhatsApp).
- Verify using a trusted phone number or contact or check via their official website or app.
- Never be rushed into clicking a link that requests you reset your password, secure your account or requires your personal or banking details.
- ▶ No genuine organisation will phone or message you unexpectedly and ask you to make changes to your device or give them remote access.

Step 3 - Software updates

- ▶ Always keep your device software, apps and other programs up-to-date to fix newly identified security bugs and vulnerabilities.
- ▶ Also enable Automatic Updates on your computer, phone and tablet where available.
- ▶ Do not use devices that cannot be fully updated as this may put your personal data at risk.

Step 4 - Backup important data


- Make regular copies of all your important documents, messages, contacts, photos and videos on a separate device or system.
- ▶ Ideally use at least one local backup (eg. flash drive, separate hard drive) and a cloud based backup (eg. iCloud, OneDrive, Google Drive).
- ▶ Ensure all of your important documents are included, and that you also disconnect local backup drives to minimise the affect of malware.

Thank you to everyone who has taken our message on board and now takes their soft plastics to the Co-op for recycling and empty blister packs to the library. Every little bit helps to reduce landfill and keep harmful plastics out of the environment.

We have a couple of extra ideas for you now! Did you know that Wilkinson's in have Wellingborough recycling scheme for disposable face а (#ReclaimTheMask)? Hopefully we will be using masks less and less over the coming months and I, for one, have a pile of used masks that I don't feel comfortable putting in the normal bin and so on to landfill. Wilkinson's have a



recycling bin in store and the masks are recycled and turned into building materials!

Also, if you have old clothes that are not suitable or in good enough condition to be donated to charity shops - don't throw them into landfill. Certain Tesco's stores are running a 'De-tox your wardrobe' campaign where you can recycle clothes in any condition. Those clothes that can't be re-Wollaston's used are recycled and Tesco's claim that 'nothing is wasted or sent to landfill'. Our nearest participating store is at Weston Favell.

How to help local homeless people

Have you ever walked past someone sleeping rough and not known how to help?

Homelessness is a big problem across the UK, and sadly that includes our local area. In Bedfordshire and the Milton Keynes area there's a lot of amazing work going on to help homeless people, but there are simply not enough affordable homes. As well as those sleeping rough, there are many hidden homeless people who are also sofa-surfing or stuck in temporary accommodation, often lacking basic essentials for daily life.

How to help?

Christian (pictured) used to be homeless and is now being supported by Bedfordshire charity Emmaus Village Carlton. Along with others from Emmaus, he now volunteers every week to help local rough sleepers. We asked Christian to answer some questions about how people can help...

If I see someone sleeping rough, what can I do?

"You can help connect someone with local services by calling Streetlink on 0300 500 0914 or by downloading their app (but if someone needs



urgent medical assistance or is in danger, do call 999). Loneliness is also a big problem so if you can, please stop and talk. You could ask if there's anything they need, like a hot drink, something to eat, or warm clothing."

How do I find help locally, for someone who's at risk of becoming homeless?

"Emmaus Village Carlton is the charity that's helped get me back on my feet. Based just outside of Carlton, north Bedfordshire, it offers a home, support, meaningful work and training to people who are homeless or are at risk of becoming homeless. If you know someone who Emmaus might be able to help, you can call their Support Office on 01234 720826.

How can I help a local homelessness charity?

"There are many great homelessness organisations in our local area, which all need support. The charity that's helped me is Emmaus Village Carlton. You can help by visiting their three charity shops and bistro on School Lane, Carlton (open Wed – Sat 9.30am – 4.30pm / Sun 10am – 4pm) and by passing on your unwanted things for resale. The event was a huge success and we wish to thank everyone who supported in any way, a grand total of £2000 was donated to DEC Ukraine Fund.

Families in need received Easter Eggs which were kindly donated by the Freemasons and 30 children received lovely Easter Themed craft packs.

We are very conscious of the current economic crisis and the effect it is having on everyone and WABIK is keen to help wherever possible. We have posted many money saving tips and energy saving advice as well as updates from saving experts, recipe ideas and benefit information. We have recently introduced a box on the food table where people can drop off or collect vouchers from. If you receive a money saving voucher that you will not use, please consider dropping it off for others to benefit from, similarly, help yourself to vouchers you need.

Due to the continuous risk of covid, the committee has decided to postpone our seaside trip and this decision will be reviewed next year. We hope to hold our Yard Sale later on this year and look forward to another great day in both Wollaston And Bozeat.

Taz - "... I like coming to the YC to see my friends and socialise with people who I might not have met elsewhere. Staff are all very sweet and friendly and have good activities organised. I liked the virtual reality and archery activities as I hadn't tried these before..."

Our young people enjoy attending our club, but there is also reward for our volunteers. Wollaston Parish Council's statement on the new Community Centre & Pre-school

For Information Only

Wollaston residents will have seen that the Hookhams Path development work has started and we expect that the new homes will be built over the next few years. As part of the development agreement, Bloor Homes are legally required to allocate a fixed % of funds, called \$106, to specified projects in the Wollaston community. This agreement has now been signed and details were published in the first edition of the revised village magazine, Wollaston Together from March 2022, which can be found at www.wollastontogether.co.uk.

Also, the owners of the Hookhams Path land, The Duchy of Lancaster, have granted Wollaston Parish Council a plot of land for a proposed new Community Hub. This is located in the field opposite the Main School.

The grant of land can only be used for a Pre-School and Community Hub, and the Parish Council will now take the next step and meet with architects to prepare plans which will show what a future Pre-School and Community Hub will look like. When the Parish Council is satisfied with the plans, they will be presented to the Community.

The current Pre-School at the existing Village Hall is unable to provide full day facilities, as the hall is used by many other village organisations. This is putting the Busy Bees Pre-School under severe financial pressure. The new Pre-School building on the new Community Hub site will be independent of the new Hub and able to offer full day facilities to the Village children, while allowing other groups in the village to use the main building at the same time

The land donated to the village is 0.3 hectares which is 2.5 times larger than the current Village Hall site. There is space to create an energy efficient building which will have a self-contained Pre-School and a Community Hub, whose design could also incorporate a theatre format.

The Parish Council will look to present plans to the Community by the Autumn together with an idea of construction costs and required funding.
